CELEBRITY CAT LIL BUB TO MAKE A SPECIAL NEW YORK APPEARANCE AT MUSEUM OF THE MOVING IMAGE

Astoria, Queens, NY, January 19, 2016—Lil BUB, the celebrity cat who captured the Internet's imagination with her big eyes, dangling tongue, and "perma-kitten" features, will make a special New York appearance at Museum of the Moving Image on Saturday, January 30, 2016. In conjunction with the exhibition *How Cats Took Over the Internet*, the Museum will present **"The Story of Lil BUB"** featuring the famous cat and her "dude" Mike Bridavsky who will share their remarkable story. This program takes place at 1:00 p.m. in the Sumner M. Redstone Theater; tickets are \$25.

In addition, a limited number of tickets will be available for a **"Lil BUB Meet and Greet Fundraiser"** (at 4:00 p.m.), with all proceeds going to Lil BUB's Big Fund at the ASPCA. Tickets for the Meet and Greet are \$100 and include the following:

Film Screenings: Friday evenings, Saturdays and Sundays, and as scheduled. Unless otherwise noted, tickets are \$12 adults / \$9 students and seniors / \$6 children 3–12 / free for Museum members at the Film Lover and MoMI Kids Premium levels and above. Advance purchase is available online. Film tickets include same-day admission to the Museum’s galleries.
